Gospel for The Feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi) Cycle A John 6:51-58

Jesus said to the crowd:

'I am the living bread which has come down from heaven. Anyone who eats this bread will live for ever; and the bread that I shall give is my flesh,

for the life of the world.'

Then the Jews started arguing with one another: 'How can this man give us his flesh to eat?' they said. Jesus replied: 'I tell you most solemnly,

if you do not eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his

blood,

you will not have life in you.

Anyone who does eat my flesh and drink my blood has eternal life,

and I shall raise him up on the last day.

For my flesh is real food

and my blood is real drink.


He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood

lives in me

and I live in him.

As I, who am sent by the living Father, myself draw life from the Father,

so whoever eats me will draw life from me. This is the bread come down from heaven; not like the bread our ancestors ate: they are dead, but anyone who eats this bread will live for ever.'



Reflection:

Jesus tells the crowd that he is the bread of life. He explains that just as God gave the Israelites manna to sustain them in the desert, so now God has sent new manna that will give eternal life. Jesus tells us that He is the living bread and He will come and live in people through the Eucharist.

In the Gospel story before this one, a crowd of people had gathered. Jesus had blessed five loaves and two fish, and there was enough to feed over five thousand people.

The feeding of the 5,000 is the only one of Jesus' miracles to appear in all four Gospels, apart from the miracle of the resurrection. This makes it a really significant event. The disciples wanted Jesus to send the crowd away. Instead Jesus empowered them to go out among the crowds and feed the hungry people. The word **hunger** describes needs that human beings have other than food. We can have spiritual, emotional, and psychological hunger or needs, such as compassion, forgiveness, friendship, affirmation...Jesus wants His disciples to care about the people they meet and make a difference in their lives, no matter what they may hunger for. He wants us, as His disciples, to show God's love and compassion to everyone we know.

Let us Pray:

Catholics believe that Jesus is present in the Eucharist –This means that when the priest blesses the bread it becomes the body of Jesus. He is here to spend time with us. How amazing is that! Lord, I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof, but only say the word, and my soul shall be healed.
